On the Occasion of Holocaust Day, 2025

Jews in Israel and Throughout the World¹

- At the beginning of 2024, the world Jewish population was 15.7 million, of them 7.1 million live in Israel (45% of the world Jewish population) and 6.3 (40% of the world Jewish population) live in the United States.
- In 1939, on the eve of World War II, the world Jewish population was 16.6 million, of whom 449,000 (3%) lived in Israel.
- In 1948, on the eve of the establishment of the State of Israel, the world Jewish population was 11.5 million, of whom 650,000 (6%) lived in Israel.

Holocaust Survivors

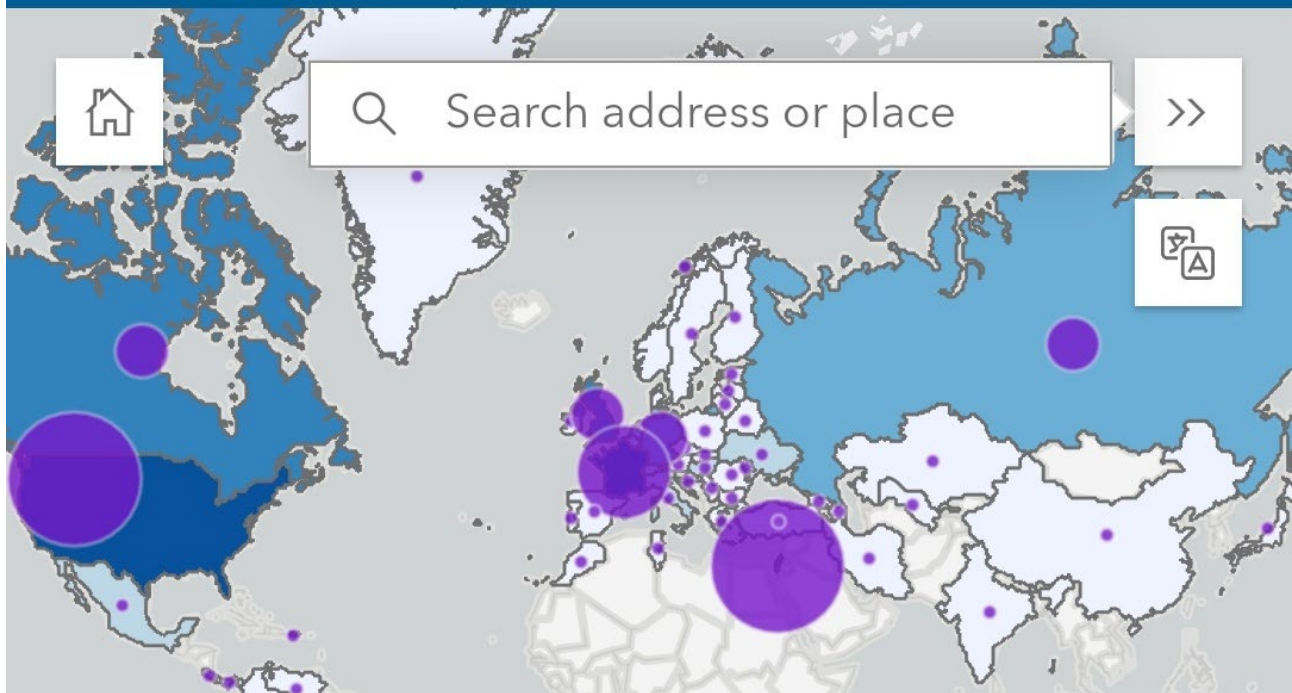
- On the eve of Holocaust Day 2025, there are about 120,000 Holocaust survivors and victims of anti-Semitic acts perpetrated during the Holocaust living in Israel.

Based on estimates for the beginning of 2025

- Women constitute 62% of the Holocaust survivors, and men constitute 38%.
- Of the survivors, about 6.1% immigrated to Israel before the establishment of the state, during 1933–1947. About one-third (30.3%) of the survivors immigrated to Israel in the great wave of immigration after the establishment of the state (1948–1951). Another 30.0% immigrated in the years 1952–1989, and about one-third (33.6%) immigrated since the 1990s, during the last wave of immigration from the USSR (former).

¹ The definitions of the population in all countries, except for Israel, refer to a “core” Jewish population that includes people who define themselves as Jewish, or people who were born to Jewish parents who do not have another religious or ethnic self-definition. The data about world Jewry are based on the decades-long work of Prof. Sergio Della Pergola at the Division of Jewish Demography and Statistics, Avraham Harman Institute of Contemporary Jewry, the Hebrew University of Jerusalem (see [American Jewish Year Book 2023](#)).

Holocaust Survivors

On the eve of Holocaust Day 2025, there are 120,000 Holocaust survivors and victims of anti-Semitic acts perpetrated during the Holocaust living in Israel.

The data published in this release are taken from a file obtained from the Holocaust Survivors' Rights Authority. The Holocaust Survivors' Rights Authority serves as an arm of the State of Israel to compensate Holocaust survivors who survived in concentration camps, ghettos, and hiding places, as well as World War II disabled, persons disabled as a result of Nazi persecution, and refugees. In addition, the Holocaust Survivors' Rights Authority has recognized the status of Iraqi residents who underwent the Farhud² events of June 1941, as well as that of Moroccan and Algerian residents who experienced

² The Farhud refers to the pogrom against the Jewish population in Baghdad, the capital of Iraq, on the Shavuot (Pentecost) holiday in 1941. At least 179 Jews were murdered, 2,118 were wounded, and 242 children were orphaned. The property of about 50,000 persons was looted (see Wikipedia)

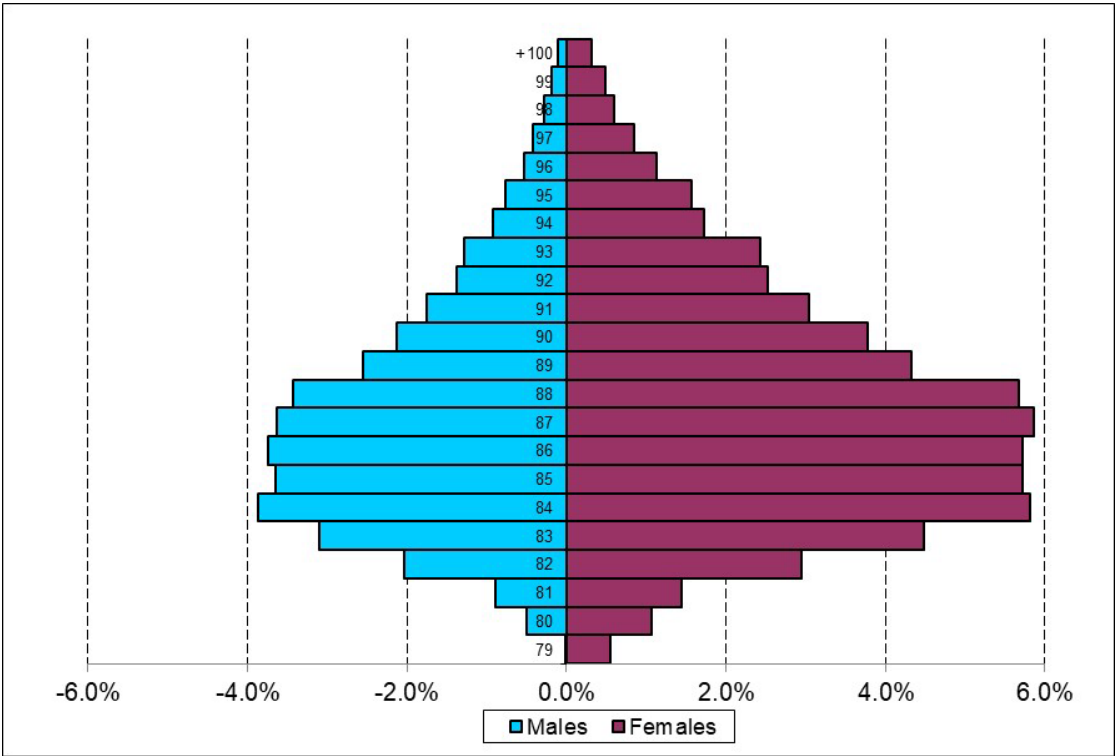
restrictions on employment and residence during the Vichy regime and were exposed to the Nazi regime.

Selected Demographic Data (estimates for the Beginning of 2025)

Age and Sex

Women constitute 62% of the Holocaust survivors, and men constitute 38%. About 43% of the survivors were born during the Second World War, between 1939 and 1945; they were aged 79–84 at the beginning of 2025. Another 36% of the survivors were aged 85–89, and the rest were over 90 (about 20%).

Marital Status

About 52.3% of the survivors were widowed, 35.3% were married, 10.5% were divorced and about 2% were never-married. About half of the Holocaust survivors are married to a Holocaust survivor spouse – 20,900 out of 42,400. That is, 10,400 families in which both spouses are Holocaust survivors live in Israel today.

Country of Birth and Immigration Period

Persons born in Europe constitute 60.7% of the Holocaust survivors living in Israel. The largest group (35.9%) consists of persons born in the USSR (former), another 10.6% were born in Romania, and 4.7% were born in Poland.

Persons born in Morocco constitute 16.8% of the Holocaust survivors, about 2.2% are persons born in Algeria who experienced various restrictions during the Vichy regime, and 10.9% are persons born in Iraq who underwent the Farhud pogrom. Persons born in Tunisia and Libya constitute the remaining 6.6%.

Of the survivors, about 6.1% immigrated to Israel before the establishment of the state, during 1933–1947; 30.3% of the survivors immigrated to Israel in the great wave of immigration after the establishment of the state (1948–1951); 30.0% immigrated in the years 1952–1989, and about one-third (33.6%) immigrated since the 1990s, during the last wave of immigration from the USSR (former).

About 58.3% of Holocaust survivors from Germany and Austria immigrated to Israel before the establishment of the state. Most of the survivors from Poland, Bulgaria, Hungary, Iraq, and Libya immigrated to Israel in the great wave of immigration (1948–1951). Most of the survivors born in Morocco and Tunisia immigrated in the 1950s and 1960s, whereas most survivors of the USSR (former) immigrated since 1990.

Geographic Distribution

Approximately 95% of the survivors reside in urban localities and 5% in rural localities, similar to the distribution among the population of Jews and Others in Israel.⁴

Approximately 49% of the survivors reside in the largest cities (numbering 200,000 residents or more): approximately 8,000 in Haifa, 7,600 in Jerusalem, 6,500 in Tel Aviv-Yafo, 5,900 in Ashdod, 5,800 in Netanya, 5,000 in Petah Tiqwa, and 4,900 in each of the cities Be'er Sheva and Rishon LeZiyyon.

Of the Holocaust survivors, 10% reside in institutions, similar to 9% of elderly Jews and Others.

⁴ "Others" include non-Arab Christians and persons not classified by religion in the Population Register.
